Adam's Temptation	Christ's Temptation
In Paradise – full stomach	In Wilderness – fast for 40 days
Wife, as companion, provided support	Alone – greater temptation to sin when alone
Absence of presence and custom of sin	Sinful culture & environment
Adam gave into first temptation he faced	Jesus repeatedly resisted temptation (Heb 4:15)
Adams consequence brought death to humanity	Jesus' victory over temptation allowed Him to complete the process of redemption successfully


